- April 10, 2018: SCCoLPA's 78th Annual Meeting and Installation of Officers





Member in the Spotlight - February 2018

Jeanne K. Smith

I am honored to announce that Jeanne K. Smith is our February Spotlight Member. She was born and raised in Urbana, Illinois until the age of 14, when her family moved for Palo Alto for her father's health.

Her great-grandmothers were friends and lived next door to each other which translated to the fact that her grandmothers and their sisters were best friends. They



have a photo of both families together when her Mom was 2 and her Dad was 5. This photo hangs on their wall surrounded with black and white photos of 6 generations of women. Jeanne's daughter calls it the "Womens' Shrine." She says that all of her family gatherings were reunions of friends as well as family, and she was raised with amazing support from these adults, who were all teachers!

Many of you may know Jeanne's story, but she did not choose her path that lead her to the legal community - it chose her! Having been widowed with two babies, and losing five immediate family members in five years (including both of her parents), she was asked to write about what she learned about preparation and estate settlement which launched her business, 25 years ago. The name of her company is "Exit Stage Right, LLC." Jeanne is a Professional Estate Organizer.

When asked what motivates her, Jeanne's reply is knowing that she can be of assistance to clients who are overwhelmed with their administrative duties, the contents of the estate home, etc. In addition, she helps clients with their own home and/or office.

Jeanne's typical day is anything but typical. Each client's needs are different. One client might have her sorting the "stuff" in a late hoarder's home, doing a pictorial inventory of 600+ pieces of fine jewelry, clearing out an old filing system and finding \$70,000 in cash, or creating a filing system for a family of wealth who cannot locate documents on their numerous homes. The variety keeps her on her toes and her clients have ranged from age 11 years to those in their 90's. They all tell Jeanne stories about their "things" as she helps them.

Jeanne has said that Santa Clara County Legal Professionals are a great group of people and that she appreciates the friendships that have developed. Professionally, she said she would like to keep expanding her knowledge base and stay current. Jeanne believes the more she knows - the better she can assist her clients!

A few tidbits about Jeanne that she would like to share is that she met her second husband whom she met in high school and reconnected with 18 years later. He was the drum major and she was the drummer. They have three children with two grandchildren who live in Oklahoma, Caleb age 7, and Vivi age 2. Jeanne said her family is comprised of teachers - both of her grandmothers, a grandfather, great aunts, and her daughter. She thought that she had missed that genetic trait called "teaching" - until she realized that HER classroom is the client's home - she teaches as they organize!

What is *Ex Post Facto* Law?

In legal circles, "ex post facto" - from the Latin, "after the fact," - refers to any law that punishes a person for an act that, at the time it was committed, was not a crime. Likewise, laws that increase the penalty for a specific crime can't be applied to a criminal act that took place before the stiffer sentences were passed. For example, a fugitive from justice who is caught after a number of years has to be tried and sentenced by the laws that were in effect when he committed his crime. Article I, Section 10 of the U.S. Constitution guarantees that "No state shall ... pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or rant any title

of nobility."

Legal Procedures - The Latest Updates

SANTA CLARA COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT E-FILING UPDATE

E-filing for all Civil cases will be mandatory starting Tuesday, February 13, 2018.

E-filing for Family, Complex Civil, Unlawful Detainer, Civil Harrasment, Small Claims, and Probate cases is now mandatory.

The Court has published local rules regarding electronic filing. Click <u>here</u> for a copy of the latest local rules.

Changes to California Rules:

Changes to the California Code of Civil Procedure and the California Rules of Court

will take effect January, 1, 2018. Among other things, there will be significant changes to CCP section 1010.6 regarding electronic filing and electronic service.

Key changes are:

- * Authorizes electronic filing and service to occur until midnight
- * Authorizes electronic filing and service by and on persons other than parties
- * Authorizes use of electronic signatures on electronically filed documents signed under penalty of perjury (pending Judicial Council action/creation of new rules)





150 Years after Ratification of the 14th Amendment: What Does Equal Protection Mean to Students?

Ratified on July 9, 1868, the 14th Amendment to the Constitution provides, in part, that no state can "deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws." Over the past 150 years, Congress and the courts have applied this "Equal Protection Clause" to our right to equal educational opportunities. Noteworthy court decisions include:

- <u>Mendez v. Westminster School District</u>, decided in 1947, in which the placement
 of Mexican-American students into separate "Mexican schools" was found to
 violate their rights under the Equal Protection Clause;
- Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, decided in 1954, in which the placement
 of white and African-American students in different public schools on the basis of
 race was also found to violate the Equal Protection Clause;
- Lau v. Nichols, decided in 1974, in which the lack of supplemental language instruction in public school for students with limited English proficiency was found to have violated the Civil Rights Act of 1964;
- <u>Regents of the University of California v. Bakke</u>, decided in 1978, and <u>Grutter</u> v. <u>Bollinger</u> and <u>Gratz v. Bollinger</u>, decided in 2003, in which certain affirmative action policies used by two universities to increase minority enrollment were upheld while others were struck down; and





Federal court decisions ended the practice of having segregated schools for Mexican-American and African-American students.

 Endrew F. v. Douglas County School District. decided in 2017, in which public schools were required, under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, to provide disabled students with opportunities to make meaningful, "appropriately ambitious" progress, such as grade-level advancement.

Congress applied the Equal Protection Clause to education by enacting laws governing state school programs or activities:

- · Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits exclusion of a student based solely on race, color or national origin;
- Title IX of the Civil Rights Act, enacted in 1972, which prohibits exclusion of a student solely on the basis of sex;
- · The Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which prohibits exclusion of a student based solely on the basis of a disability; and
- The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 1990, which provides protections and educational opportunities for students with disabilities.

The prompt for the 2018 Ninth Circuit Civics Contest is "What does equal protection mean to students?"

Students should consider how the Equal Protection Clause applies in high schools, colleges and graduate schools, whether in admissions, classrooms or on athletic fields. Individual students can express their thoughts and ideas in an essay of between 500 and 1,000 words. Individuals and teams of up to three students can produce a 3-5 minute video on the theme. A student may submit both an essay and video. A student may submit only one essay and be involved in the production of only one video.

The essay or video should: 1) Demonstrate an understanding of the historical background of the Equal Protection Clause; 2) Explain the constitutional powers and rights relevant to the court cases and laws mentioned above; and 3) Discuss the important role of the Judicial Branch in preserving the rights of Americans to equal education.

The 2018 Ninth Circuit Civics Contest is open to high school students in nine western states and two Pacific island jurisdictions. Students from public, private, parochial and charter schools and home-schooled students of equivalent grade status may enter.



The U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California and the Northern California Chapter of the Federal Bar Association will conduct preliminary judging for the district-level competition. Finalists in both the essay and the video competitions at the district level will receive cash awards and advance to compete in the Circuit-wide contest. To be eligible to compete in the local contest, students must reside in one of the these counties: Alameda, Contra Costa, Del Norte, Humboldt, Lake, Marin, Mendocino, Monterey, Napa, San Benito, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and Sonoma.
